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A is for Attendance!

Obviously, attendance levels, especially at this time of year, can be affected by illness, particularly colds and tummy bugs. We would therefore encourage all parents to send their children into school wherever possible. However, if they have been ill with sickness and/or diarrhoea, please keep them off school until they have been symptom free for a minimum of 48 hours to prevent the bug spreading throughout the school community as this has a significant, adverse effect on attendance levels.

Reporting an absence



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If your child is too ill to attend school, please contact the school office in the morning with full details of your child's illness/symptoms. If we do not hear from you, we will ring you to find out why your child is not in school. If we are unable to make contact and you do not provide a reason for your child's absence, this absence will be recorded as unauthorised.

It is essential that your child is at school on time and ready to learn. Any unauthorised absence negatively impacts on our overall attendance figure as well as your child's attendance and achievement levels. Arriving on time for school is important as children miss important information during registration including the plan of the day and the learning of the day.






Maths Magicians

We have also had many opportunities this term to learn outside of the classroom. In Geography, the children used the character muscle of teamwork to navigate themselves around the school to find the hidden treasure.

The children showed fantastic respect when visiting the Methodist Church. They loved seeing Santa and all the beautiful decorations that were on display, some made by Riverside pupils themselves!

Overall, Year 1 are not only growing as learners but also as respectful, kind individuals within the school and we are greatly looking forward to the next term!







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Year 2

Year 2 have been absolute superstars this term! They are consistently challenging themselves, displaying our 6Rs and growing their love of learning.

One of our highlights this term has been visiting Tamworth castle where we learnt all about lords and ladies and their lives within the castle walls. We even got to try out jousting whilst we were there.

In the classroom, we have been working on our problem-solving skills and learning all about the properties of 2D and 3D shapes. We have also enjoyed reading our class book "The boy who grew dragons" which we took inspiration from to create our own wanted posters for the naughty dragons who stole our pencils!

Resilience and creativity are character muscles we have been developing this term, particularly during our creating of our clay dragon eyes and building our drawbridge pulleys for a castle.

Overall, Year 2 are flourishing both personally and academically and we couldn't be prouder!

We can't wait to extend our knowledge even more in the new year.



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


Year 3

Year 3 have had a fantastic start to the year and have had much to celebrate. In Music, the children have been learning to use a very unusual instrument called a "Boomwhacker" and have been learning to play music, read notation and improvise over backing tracks.

The children have worked really hard in all lessons and have been making progress in English through writing a narrative, a diary and a non-chronological report.

Through our topic of Raiders and Invaders, we have designed and made our own Roman shields in DT and have been working on a mosaic in our Art lessons. We have also been comparing the Romans and the Vikings and asking the question; which would we rather be? Ask us to find out!









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Year 4

Year 4 have had a super start to the year and have had much to celebrate. In French the children have been learning different parts of the body, what they like to eat and why. They are showing confidence and flair in speaking French and with a lovely accent!

Your children have shown resilience in lessons and they are enjoying their learning. In English, they have written letters, a non-chronological report, poetry, and a diary entry. In maths, we have added, subtracted, covered place value, rounding, area of shapes, learned about odd and even numbers and recently we are working on multiplication and division.

Through our topic of Tudors, we went to the Battle of Bosworth fields and it was fascinating! The children have thoroughly enjoyed learning about the Tudor monarchs, especially what happened to Henry VIII's wives! We have also covered what Tudor houses were like and even made pottage, which is a thick soup made with vegetables and oats.

This first term has been wonderful and we look forward to the next one with anticipation. We have lots more exciting learning planned and we look forward to seeing our children become more confident and show even more progress.



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Year 5

Year 5 have had a great start to the year and have shown everyone that they are all champions!

We have particularly enjoyed our Ancient Greece topic; where we have learnt about what life was like, the history of the Olympics and Greek gods and goddesses in History. In English, we have been reading Who Let the Gods Out? which inspired our writing of exciting narratives, newspaper reports and poetry. We have been enjoying DT, where we have learnt how to safely chop ingredients in preparation to making a Greek salad. We were excited to welcome our external visitor who took us back in time to learn even more about Ancient Greece through an interactive drama workshop. We had an absolutely fun morning and learnt using new methods!

This term, we have shown resilience and perseverance in our weekly swimming lessons. We have enjoyed learning new skills and the importance of safety in water.

We happily welcomed in the festive season by learning carols for our Christmas Carol performance and making Christmas decorations with friends and family.

Year 5 have worked extremely hard this term and we cannot wait to get stuck back in after the Christmas break.



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Year 6

Year 6 have blown us away with their consistent resilience, positive attitude and growing independence throughout this term. They have thrown themselves into immersive learning experiences at Beaumanor Hall, challenged themselves personally at Pioneer and continued to be captivated by their learning inside the classroom.

Academically, they have loved reading Goodnight Mr Tom and War Horse, tackled many problem-solving challenges around the four operations and fractions and even taken on new knowledge about Charles Darwin and Carl Linnaeus in Science. Their minds are growing each day and we couldn't be prouder of what they have achieved so far!
