Well that's another half term flown by! It's been fantastic to be back at school and to feel the Riverside buzz. A massive thank you to all of our superstar children and to you superstar parents/carers for your incredibly warm welcome back.

The curriculum is continuing to flourish at Riverside, the children have enjoyed the full spectrum of learning including Latin in Y3, Character Award in Y4 and swimming lessons in Y5. We also warmly welcome back 'Forest Schools' with Miss Attwood-Clarke, with the first group of forest foragers enjoying their weekly Friday session.

Our swimming pool renovation is now complete and we are looking forward to unveiling the new 'wellness centre' soon after the half term break. It is still awaiting furnishings but we are hopeful the space will be ready to use in the very near future. This is an exciting space as we will be using the centre to further support the social, emotional and well-being needs of our children as well as using the space to support local community groups and our other Birstall primary schools. "I love being a mathematician because I get to help lots of children in the lower years and I teach them skills they can apply to their maths," – Vihaan Patel (5 Athens)







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Pupil Premium

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Examples of how pupil premium can support children includes exciting new learning activities and opportunities to widen their life experiences, financial support for after school clubs, school trips and school milk to name a few.

Pupil Premium is extra government money which is paid to schools to support children's learning and development.

This funding is targeted at students facing the greatest disadvantage. The Government believes that Pupil Premium is the most effective way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for Free School Meals and their wealthier peers. Pupil Premium is therefore provided to any child currently eligible for Free School Meals that the school is aware of, and to any child who has at any stage in the past six years been eligible – children in care, and those who have spent at least one day in the care system, and the children of parents who are serving in the armed forces, are also eligible.

Your child may be able to get pupil premium if you get any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

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The Bears and the Eagles have been very busy learning lots of new sounds in phonics, recently we have been learning more 'special friend' sounds like 'ee', 'ow' and 'igh' this has been helping us to read. Lots of children read at home everyday which is fantastic and helps them to earn special prizes like a bookmark and a wristband!

We have also been thinking about signs of winter and looking out for seasonal changes, this is very important when we think about what sort of weather we might see in winter and what we need to wear to keep us warm.

In our classroom we have had a new addition of 'Beebots' which are little robots that we can move by pressing buttons. We have really enjoyed giving the Beebots instructions and using the maps to get to a destination!

We have started to write our own stories using the sounds that we have learnt and had a go at putting them together to make a word. We love writing stories about monsters and unicorns but also, we love to write about our families and what makes them special to us. Of course, we have also been doing lots of learning in the moment and making an adventure out of every day!



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The children in Year 1 are so passionate about climate change. The children have wanted to pursue different ways of raising awareness about global warming and finding ways to make a difference.

We have been learning about using exclamation marks in our English lessons to make people listen and so we have featured these in posters that we have made about climate change. We are going to share our posters with Birstall Council to see if we can have them put up in the village to remind people about what climate change is and what they can do to help.

Our next plan is to go and do some litter picking at Watermead as we know how bad litter is for animals and the environment.

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Year 2 have had a brilliant start to 2022, we have been exploring how plastic is made, how it can affect our environment and what we can all do to help.

In English we have read the books 'A planet full of plastic and 'The journey home'. The children have loved exploring different ways to help our planet and environment, we even wrote a persuasive letter to Ms Williams explaining how we can reduce plastic in our schools and also re-told our own story of 'The journey home'.


Furthermore, in geography we have been asking geographical questions and exploring different maps, looking at their features and their symbols. In addition to this, we also had lots of fun making ourselves into 'where's Wally' and locating where we live on a map.

In computing, we have been developing our skills and using the website 'Scratch' learning how to code. We can now create a sprite and code them to move and talk.

We are incredibly proud of the resilience and determination of all the children in Year 2 this term and we cannot wait to learn more next term!







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
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Paris have enjoyed learning how to play the game Hockey. They have developed their skills and knowledge of how to use a Hockey stick and have practised demonstrating control by dribbling the ball around cones as well as shooting. They have taken the time to build up their control of using a hockey stick and have played a range of skills-based games to develop their speed.

Paris have even begun to learn the rules of the game of Hockey and how to be a good team player. The children thoroughly enjoyed playing a tournament and working together as a team. They observed each other playing and were able to give praise and encouragement, alongside some handy tips of how they could improve further.

We have been really proud of Paris for their commitment, enthusiasm and resilience with playing the game. **Go Paris!** 









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This term, Year 3 have been looking at the world around us. The children have been reading the book 'Journey'. This inspired our diary entries and many other pieces of writing. The children have worked hard to learn how to develop their sentences and use a range of punctuation

In science we have been looking at animals including humans. The children have been investigating how to classify different animals by the type of backbone that they have and by the categories that they fall into: mammals, insects, birds, etc. We went on a walk down to the canal to see what impact human activity has had on the local area and to see what types of animals we could find. In addition, we looked at the locks and what they are there and how they work. We discovered the difference between and a river and a canal and we looked at how humans use the water.





In maths, we finished off our topic on multiplication and moved onto money. We were able to recognise coins and notes. Moreover, we looked at how we add and subtract different amounts of money.

To develop the children's times table knowledge, we have set up battles between the two classes on Times Tables Rock Stars. We have a leader board outside the classroom that is updated each day. Reykjavik have been in the lead so far but Cape Town are catching up!





We have started to learn French in Year 3. So far, we have been looking at basic greetings, classroom instructions and animals. The children have enjoyed learning a new language.

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Year 4 have had a brilliant start to 2022, undertaking a variety of different topics and skills. In English, we created passionate discussion texts, arguing why animals shouldn't be performing in circuses. As well as this, year 4 have been learning and producing 3 different types of poetry: Kennings, Tankas and Haikus. Each of these poems came with a range of features that the children in year 4 mastered to able to write their very own poems all about circuses. We have just begun learning all about instructions, and we will continue this into Spring 2.

In science, we have completed our topic on electricity, which involved creating circuits, incorporating switches and experimenting with conductors and insulators. We have recently begun our next topic of forces, which we are very excited about and will link in heavily with our topic of fairgrounds.

Year 4 have excelled in computing this term, learning how to edit photos in a variety of ways. In DT, we have researched fairgrounds and in pairs we have picked an aspect of fairgrounds we will be making. We have learnt about how fairgrounds work, including levers and pulleys, and we will be using this knowledge to make a replica ride out of recycled materials.

We have also continued our schools linking with Brocks Hill Primary School, and video called them earlier this half term. We played some games with them where got to know the other class better. Both classes have also continued learning important skills in character award, including first aid.



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This term, Year 5 have blasted off into space and have been exploring the solar system. We have been discovering the different properties of the planets, investigating how the movement of the Earth affects the length of our shadows and described how the planets and moons move around the sun.





Here are some photos of all three classes acting out the different themes in Hidden Figures. We really enjoyed using drama to share our interpretation of our thoughts in regards to the book.

Furthermore, we have been reading Hidden Figures in English this term. It has been inspirational to learn about the lives of four influential women and how they conquered segregation and gender inequality to achieve their dreams. As part of our class book, we have written insightful diary entries, persuasive letters and gripping narratives.

In History, Year 5 have been focusing on the famous astronaut Neil Armstrong and his experience on the moon. The children have produced comic strips that share his story from childhood to outer space.



In art, we have been focusing on the artist Peter Thorpe and have been analysing his abstract artwork. We had a go at producing our own pieces in his style.







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


It has been a fantastic start to our Spring Term diving straight into our new topic: South America. The children have loved looking at the world map, identifying countries and continents. Additionally, they have been fascinated by the Amazon Rainforest which is the setting of our class text: The Explorer.

We have been learning about the circulatory system in Science, where the children have been captivated, finding out about the different parts of our heart, blood vessels and what blood is actually made up of!

We are so proud of our Year 6's and how hard they have been working this year!

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Riverside promotes excellent school attendance, recognising the clear links between attendance and attainment, and attendance and safeguarding children. Our aim is for all the children on roll to attend school every day, provided that they are fit and healthy enough to do so.

Parents and Carers are asked only to withdraw their child from school if it is absolutely unavoidable. The school monitors the attendance of individual children and meet with parents where there is a concern.

#### **Procedures for Absence**

#### <u>Illness</u>

If your child is not well enough to attend school, please let us know by 9am on the day by telephone (0116 210 7373) or via e-mail to office@riversideacademy.org.uk. Please provide the reason for absence, as serious contagious diseases such as chicken pox might have implications for other children and their families.

#### Medical Appointments

We would expect medical and dental appointments to take place outside school hours, but if children do need to be taken out of school to attend such appointments please ensure you inform the School Office in advance and supply a copy of the appointment letter. All children leaving school during the school day must be signed out at the School Office when they leave and then signed in when they return.

#### <u>Lateness</u>

It is very important that your child is punctual in arriving at school. Before registration children engage in a range of activities to practise key skills of times table, number recall and spellings. If your child is late for any reason, please sign them in at the School Office.

#### **Other Absences**

If, exceptionally, you know that your child is going to be absent from school for any period of time (even if it is only part of a day) please seek authorisation in advance by completing the Authorised Absence Request Form available from the School Office. The Government and the school wish to discourage pupils from missing lessons and as such holiday request during term time.
